



In-Person Program Continuing Education Credit Reporting Information

AHLA offers a wide array of educational programs to suit all types of learning methods. For all of our In-Person Programs, we offer CLE, CPE, and CPE credits. In addition, we offer NHA credits for our Long Term Care and the Law program. The information below explains our role and/or your role in reporting your earned credits.

Continuing Professional Education (“CPE”)

Accountants are required to self-report their credits to their respective state accounting board. Sessions titled “Legal Ethics” are not approved for CPE ethics; they are only approved for CLE ethics. You may contact your state accounting board to apply for CPE ethics credit. Our NASBA Sponsor ID number you may need for self-reporting your credits is on your certificate and here for your convenience: **108213**

Compliance Certification Board (“CCB”)

Compliance professionals are required to self-report their credits to HCCA using the certificate provided by AHLA.

Nursing Home Administrator (“NHA”)

Each state board of nursing home administrators has different reporting rules and requirements. Nursing home administrators can [contact their state board](#) to self-report NHA credits. If a state board requires the National Association of Long Term Care Administrator Boards (NAB) program approval number for self-reporting NHA credits, you can find this number printed on your AHLA Certificate of Completion.

Continuing Legal Education (“CLE”) Reporting to State Bars

Alabama – AHLA reports speaker and attendee credits on behalf of attorneys
Alaska – Attorney self-reports.
Arizona – Attorney self-reports.
Arkansas – AHLA reports speaker and attendee credits on behalf of attorneys
California – Attorney self-reports.
Colorado – Attorney self-reports.
Connecticut – Attorney self-reports.
Delaware – AHLA reports attendee credits on behalf of attorneys. Attorneys must self-report speaker credits.
Florida – Attorney self-reports.
Georgia – AHLA reports speaker and attendee credits on behalf of attorneys
Hawaii – Attorney self-reports.
Idaho – AHLA reports speaker credits on behalf of attorneys. Attorneys must self-report speaker credits using linked form.
Illinois – Attorney self-reports.
Indiana – AHLA reports speaker and attendee credits on behalf of attorneys if we receive their form within the 30-day post-program deadline. After the 30-day deadline, the attorney is responsible for self-reporting their credits and paying the late fee.
Iowa – Attorney self-reports.
Kansas – Attorney self-reports using KS affidavit provided by AHLA.
Kentucky – Attorney self-reports.
Louisiana – AHLA reports speaker credits on behalf of attorneys. Attorneys must self-report speaker credits using linked form.
Minnesota – Attorney self-reports.
Mississippi – AHLA reports speaker and attendee credits on behalf of attorneys.
Missouri – Attorney self-reports.
Montana – Attorney self-reports using MT credit request form provided by AHLA.

Nebraska – AHLA reports attendee credits on behalf of attorneys. Attorneys must self-report speaker credits. More info linked for speaker credit.
Nevada – AHLA reports speaker and attendee credits on behalf of attorneys.
New Hampshire – Attorney self-reports.
New Jersey – Attorney self-reports.
New Mexico – AHLA reports speaker and attendee credits on behalf of attorneys.
New York – Attorney self-reports if program is held outside of NY. If program is held within NY, AHLA is required to report attendance on behalf of attorneys.
North Carolina – AHLA reports speaker and attendee credits on behalf of attorneys. Speakers need to sign the linked form and email it to mgrimm@healthlawyers.org for us to submit along with the attendance report. If you are unsure of how to fill out the form, you can simply send it back signed and I'll fill in the other portions.
North Dakota – Attorney self-reports.
Ohio – AHLA reports attendee credits on behalf of attorneys. Speakers must complete linked form and submit to OH to receive speaker credits.
Oklahoma – AHLA reports attendee credits on behalf of attorneys. Speakers must complete linked form and submit to OK to receive speaker credits.
Oregon – AHLA reports speaker and attendee credits on behalf of attorneys.
Pennsylvania – AHLA reports speaker and attendee credits on behalf of attorneys.
Rhode Island – AHLA submits attendance verification. Attorneys must self-report the actual amount of credit.
South Carolina – AHLA reports attendee credits on behalf of attorneys. Speakers must complete linked form and submit to SC to receive speaker credits.
Tennessee – AHLA reports speaker and attendee credits on behalf of attorneys if the course is held in TN. If the course is held outside of TN, the attorney is responsible for self-reporting their credits.
Texas – AHLA reports attendee credits on behalf of attorneys. Attorneys must self-report their speaker credits.
Utah – AHLA reports attendee credits on behalf of attorneys. Attorneys must self-report their speaker credits.
Vermont – Attorney self-reports.
Virginia – Attorney self-reports using VA form provided by AHLA. The form is also linked here.
Washington – AHLA reports attendee credits on behalf of attorneys. WA attorneys do not get extra credits for time speaking, but can request credits for preparation time by contacting WA MCLE.
West VA – AHLA reports attendee credits on behalf of attorneys. Requests for teaching credits may be self-submitted online through the attorney portal. Supporting documentation may be sent via e-mail to greshamh@wvbar.org .
